The Search

The Franklin Local Schools' Board of Education is seeking highly qualified applicants for the position of superintendent. The successful candidate will assume the position from Interim Superintendent **Rob Preston**, who has filled the role since the beginning of the 2019-20 school year. **Steve Horton**, senior board and management services consultant with OSBA, is assisting the board with its search.

The District

The Franklin Local School District is located in southern Muskingum County, east of the Columbus metro area. Approximately 2,000 students are served in five schools: Philo High School, Philo Jr. High School, Duncan Falls Elementary, Roseville Elementary and Franklin Local Community School. The district has four preschool classrooms for children ages three to five.

The mission of Franklin Local Schools is to build an academic foundation for future success. This is exemplified through the work of a dedicated staff and impressive accomplishments in academic growth. Both Duncan Falls and Roseville elementary schools received the Ohio Department of Education's Momentum Award. This is awarded to schools that have earned A's on all value-added measures on the Ohio School Report Card. The importance of being college and career ready is a driving force in our district's mission of preparing students for their future through creative, relevant and real-world instruction. Career exploration and planning activities in grades 6-12 provide opportunities for students to develop a vision and realistic plan for their future.



Franklin Local offers strong core academic programs as well as fine arts options, enrichment programs, new learning technologies and extracurricular activities to support a well-rounded educational opportunity and promote lifelong success for all students. An important focal point is the use of technology. Franklin Local is very proactive in its development of a robust information technology infrastructure that allows for opportunities through mobile devices, digital curriculum, college credit through dual-enrollment and expanding knowledge of social networking tools.

The district implemented a program that provides students in grades K-12 with direct one-to-one iPad access that supports and maximizes student learning. Through a collaboration with Mid-East Career and Technology Center, the district offers a Vocational Agriculture course to students in grades 7-10 and established an FFA (Future Farmers of America) Charter. The district is also providing teachers with the most up-to-date professional development enabling them to increase student-teacher collaboration and blended learning opportunities.

The Community

The community that supports Franklin Local Schools is comprised of Chandlersville, Duncan Falls, Philo, Roseville, Gaysport and Blue Rock. Franklin Local occupies the entire southern border of Muskingum County. The district offices are located in Duncan Falls near the falls bearing its name on the scenic Muskingum River. The district is adjacent to Maysville Local Schools, Zanesville City Schools and East Muskingum Local Schools, all located in Muskingum County. It is home to approximately 12,700 residents.

Muskingum County was officially created in January of 1804. The name is from an Indian word that means "near the river." With the exception of the county seat, Zanesville, the county is primarily rural and its beautiful wooded landscape makes it a wonderful place to live.

For the most part the economy is supported by retail establishments and manufacturing. In the late 1800s and early 1900s, Samuel A. Weller's pottery manufacturing plant was the largest of its kind in the world. Today, pottery manufacturing is still a vital part of the Muskingum County economy. Prominent residents have included astronaut John Glenn and author Zane Grey.

Muskingum County offers many educational opportunities. Muskingum University, Ohio University-Zanesville, Zane State College, Mid-East Career and Technology Centers and the Muskingum Valley Educational Service Center are all important partners of Franklin Local Schools.

Qualifications

The successful candidate should have a valid Ohio superintendent's license and be willing to reside in the district. In addition, the successful candidate should possess the following attributes:

- a knowledge of and success with implementing project-based learning;

- ability to work with the administrative team and board to complete projects;
- demonstrated strong vision for academic achievement;
- is a collaborative leader who will work well with the other educational leaders in the county and surrounding areas.
